It is probable that, in the times of Plutarch, the relation of Sulla (= SLL) to Relisarius = Valerius = Caesar had not yet been completely lost. At any rate, Plutarch made Sulla "marry" Valeria at the end of Sulla's life ([268*], V. 2, p. 147). The name "Valeria" is almost identical to "Valerius-Belisarius" (cf. Aurelia, Caesar's mother). All phonetic analogies from which we have begun studying the isomorphism only play the role of prompting hints. We now come around to more essential facts. For the reader, new is the second column in discussing the events at the beginning of the Second Empire, whereas the remaining three have been linked by
